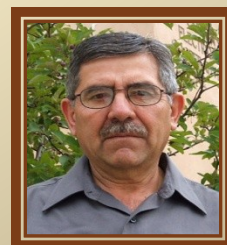

CEO REPORT



Those of us living in the communities that make up our northern New Mexico service territory know we are truly blessed with the culture, history and natural beauty that surrounds us. We may not always agree about the issues that come up, but we are like-minded in our determination to improve the quality of life for our families, friends and neighbors.

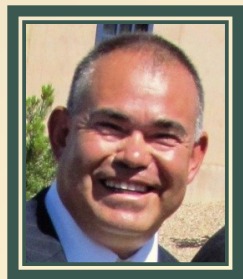
We have had numerous examples of that determination in the past year, many affecting our economy, as we slowly move out of the Great Recession that has burdened our nation, as well as our local communities. The board of trustees, management and staff at Kit Carson Electric Cooperative, Inc. are proud to do our part to assist in this economic rebound. In 2012 we saw the Enchanted Light Fiber Optic Project begin with the installation of infrastructure that will bring state-of-the-art communications technology to every home and business serviced by KCEC. Over \$12 million was contributed to the local economy in 2012 from the Enchanted Light Project.

When a challenge arose that threatened the continuation of the project over 400 of our members attended a meeting of the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission (PRC) in Santa Fe to let them know how important the project is to the economies of our communities. Because of this great show of support we were able to continue the project and make great strides toward its completion scheduled for the beginning of 2015.

Also in regard to the Enchanted Light Fiber Optic Project, we have begun beta testing in certain areas to ensure when we begin “lighting up” sections of our service territory later in 2013 the technology will work to perfection. We will be offering not only internet service at speeds now only found in metropolitan areas, but also digital telephone and television, all over a fiber optic system that is owned by our members. This system will be a great benefit to our business community, as they will be able to compete on a global level. It will also benefit individuals, who will be able to take advantage of health care, education, entertainment and other communication resources at a level not found in other rural communities. KCEC fought hard to bring this technology to our community. We received the largest fiber optic grant in the nation and the largest overall grant in the state of New Mexico in 2009 after our community joined together to give us the direction to apply not only once, but three times before receiving the award.

Another example of our member’s support is being shown in our opposition of Tri-State Generation and Transmission’s request for yet another rate increase. The proposed rate increase is currently under suspension by the PRC, thus saving our members hundreds of thousands of dollars since the ruling was put into effect. We credit our members communicating with the members of the PRC with convincing them to not let the rates go into effect until Tri-State proved their financial need. This is the ninth rate increase proposed by Tri-State since we contracted with them in 2000 (with the promise of rate stability). Each increase has been opposed by KCEC. The first eight times we were the only cooperative out of the 44 in the Tri-State system that stood up and questioned the need to impose higher rates on our consumers. This time we have been joined by Springer and Continental Divide cooperatives. With three co-ops in opposition the PRC has regulation authority over Tri-State. Their decision to suspend the rate increase means Tri-State must prove the need for more revenue before the higher rates can go into effect. Tri-State has also filed suit in federal court claiming the PRC does not have authority to regulate them. We will continue to keep you informed as this case moves through the system.

Our communities are very energy and environmentally conscious, so Tri-State’s limit of 5% of our energy consumption coming from renewable resources has once again united our members in opposition. KCEC has reached that limitation. In 2011 we were number two in the nation in solar watts per consumer.

CEO REPORT

We have since fallen out of the top ten due to our inability to go beyond the 5% limit. We encourage our members to remain involved and let the PRC, our congressional delegation and Tri-State know we remain committed to clean energy at a reasonable cost. Contact information can be found on our website at kitcarson.com.

In other highlights of 2012:

❖ **KCEC instituted the first Community Solar program in New Mexico.** KCEC Community Solar allows our members to purchase solar panels on an array located behind Taos Charter School on Paseo del Canon. The array began producing at a capacity of nearly 100kW in August 2012. Our members can buy panels on the array and all electricity generated by those panels is credited directly to their KCEC bill. This allows individuals and businesses who rent or lease to own solar. Also those living in shaded areas, which would not be efficient for home installation can still take advantage of the energy saving and environmental benefits produced by our abundant sunshine.

❖ **Two other major solar projects were also completed in 2012.** The first, energized in June 2012, is a 1.25MW array built on Rio Costilla Cooperative Livestock Association land near Amalia. The second a project completed by Blue Sky Energy, also 1.25MW, is located near the Rio Grande Gorge.

❖ **The reliability of the KCEC electric system continues to improve dramatically.** In 2012 our members experienced only 113 major outages (20 or more consumers affected). This is a sharp decline from 356 in 2011 and 559 as recently as 2007. This improvement is a direct result of system improvements that have taken place of the past two years, as well as our well-trained staff of linemen. In addition to increased electrical reliability these upgrades contributed over \$16 million to the local economy through payroll, materials, rent, meals and lodging.

❖ **We continue to improve communication with our members.** Our website at kitcarson.com has been completely revamped making it not only easier to find the information you need, but also making it much more convenient and less expensive to pay bills on-line. We have also begun sending out important updates via e-mail. If you are not one of approximately 5,000 members receiving our e-mail updates, please go to our website and click on the Customer Service tab, then the Update My Information tab to enter your e-mail address.

❖ **Solid earnings from Kit Carson Energy on propane sales allowed for a continued return on the investment made by KCEC to start up this subsidiary.** Kit Carson Energy was formed in answer to a call to action by our members to bring propane prices down. This was accomplished and the company is now on firm financial footing.

❖ **In all KCEC and the projects and programs we have developed have contributed over \$56.6 million to the economy of our communities.**

We remain committed to our mission statement which reads, “To deliver exceptional customer service with efficiency, professionalism, accountability and develop sustainable economic opportunities.” Your continued support makes this possible.

GOVERNMENT IN ACTION YOUTH TOUR WINNERS

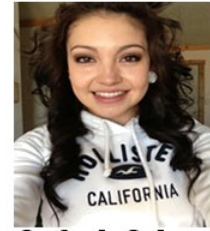

June 1996 Kit Carson Electric Cooperative consumers voted in favor of a bylaw change that allowed the establishment of a charitable foundation for the purpose of charitable assignment of patronage capital unclaimed after a two-year period. Applicants are selected by their levels of good character, academic achievement and can demonstrate a coherent degree plan and willingness to pursue a course of high learning. Over the past 17 years, the Foundation has been proud to help these students achieve their dreams where they may not have been able to move scholastically forward without the Foundations assistance.

Kit Carson Electric is proud to announce that since the inception of the Kit Carson Electric Foundation, it has awarded \$464,250.00 in scholarships. The total amount of scholarships per District from 1997 to 2013 is 500, District 1 has a total of 166, District 2 has a total of 86, District 3 has a total of 85, District 4 has a total of 84 and District 5 has a total of 79 scholarships awarded.

The total awarded donations for the year 1997 through 2010 is \$76,259.95. District 1 has been awarded \$26,250.00, District 2 has been awarded \$10,350.00, District 3 has been awarded \$13,410.00, District 4 has been awarded \$12,799.95 and District 5 has been awarded \$13,450.00.

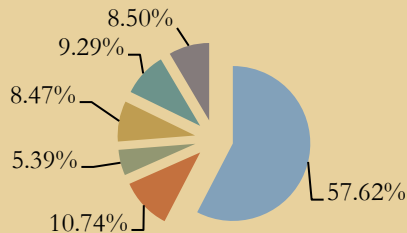

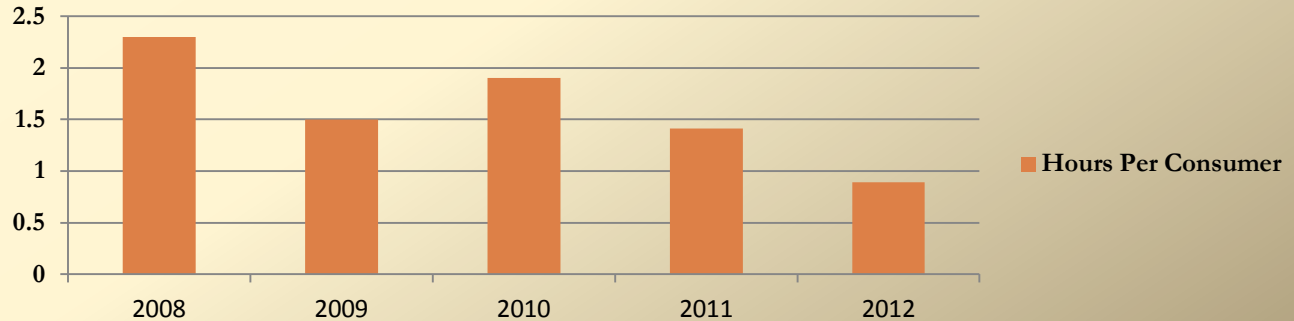

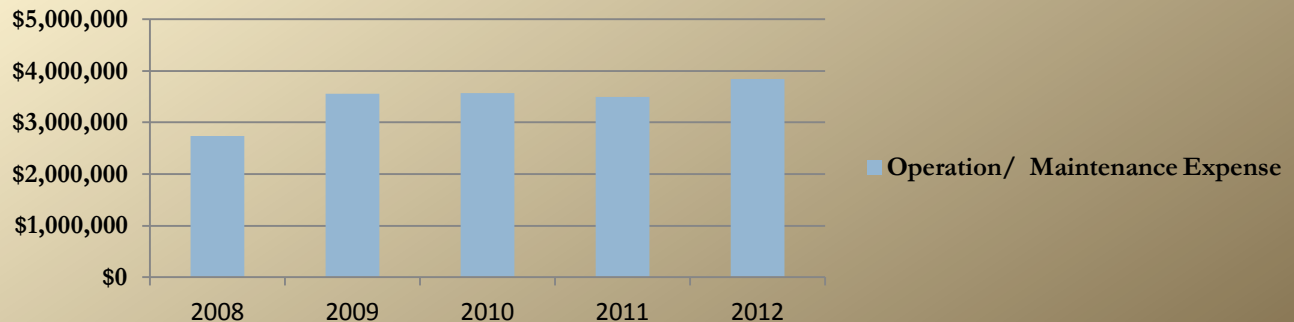

TAOS REGIONAL COMMAND & COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

The Taos Regional Command and Communications Center (TRCCC) is a 9,860 square foot state-of-the-art regional command and communications center that currently houses the Kit Carson Electric Co-op (KCEC) dispatch. We have the ability to house all emergency services such as 911, Forest Fire command, and all Homeland Security initiatives as required by each participant, as well as other potential emergencies such as the February 2011 natural gas outage.

This system will also be responsible for monitoring Cyber Security and our smart grid systems. TRCCC will also be the Network Operations Center for KCEC's Fiber Initiative project. The redundancy of the network to the TRCCC's centrally located facility 1146 Gusdorf Road allows for 24/7 uninterrupted signals.

The cost of this project was approximately \$3 million. The U.S. Department of Agriculture provided a \$550,000 grant and \$2.3 million loan to fund the project. The State of New Mexico provided \$175,000 in capital outlay. This facility will serve each and every citizen in the region and all surrounding communities.

The building will be monitored and will maintain a complete lockdown 24/7, 365 days a year. Minimum access will be granted to command center employees, 911 dispatch employees and possibly maintenance crews.

The technology and software systems being used in this building allow, us to pin point and respond more quickly and safely to outages and any electrical emergency situations that may occur. The system upgrades were put into place to benefit all members of Kit Carson Electric Cooperative.

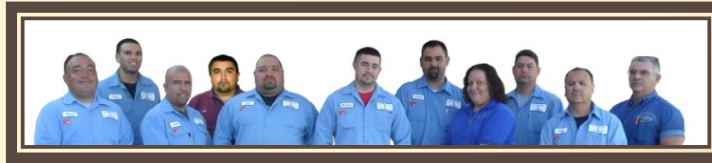
